

The fallout from actress Annie Yi's (伊能 靜) reported affair with fellow thespian and hot stud Laurence Huang (黄 維德) continued this week, when Eastern Media Group's Shopping Channel (東森購 物) terminated its contract with the disgraced star and demanded NT\$16 million from her in compensation.

The channel's spokesperson said the company's public image had been damaged by Yi's alleged transgression, namely, the tarnishing of her image as the devoted wife of singer Harlem Yu (庾澄慶) and loving mother of their six-year-old son, which were the main reasons why the company chose her to endorse its skin-care products in the first place.

The message, it seems, is that while it might be OK for male celebrities to play away, monogamy is the only option for female stars who want to safeguard their celebrity status and economic success.

Following in the footsteps of his action hero father Jackie Chan (成龍), Jaycee Chan (房 祖名) continues to add to his reputation as the Lothario par excellence of his generation, having been romantically associated with celebrity belles such as pop singers Elva Hsiao (蕭亞軒), Fish Leong (梁 靜茹), Penny Tai (戴佩妮) and Gillian Chung (鍾欣桐).

Next magazine reports that Junior's tastes have changed and that he now favors long-legged models like Huang Ching-li (黄景 例), whom he was spotted with on his birthday on Wednesday at Taipei's Joyce Cafe and, later that evening, the nightclub Primo. What surprised the



paparazzi even more, however, was how much the son's mother, Joan Lin (林 鳳嬌), has aged. Lin married Jackie Chan some 20 years ago when her career as a movie superstar was at its peak, then promptly retired

Judging from a snapshot taken on Wednesday and printed in the magazine, Lin looks exactly like your typical 55-year-old housewife, rather than an aging celebrity who relies on Botox to maintain her looks.

singer Stanley Huang (黃立 行) beat out Hong Kong's Edison Chen (陳冠希) for the title of hottest bad-boy singer, according to the poll conducted by Yahoo Taiwan at tw.music.yahoo.com/poll/ list.html. Gossip-mongers attribute the heartthrob's success in this area to his album We All Lay Down in the End (最後只好躺下來), which was released earlier this month. Huang's music is regarded as a fine piece of sultry work and is loaded "I want to strip you, exploit you, suck you and thrust you. I want to torture you."

Local actress and television host Pink Yang (楊 千霈) is attracting the media's attention with her debut on the high society scene. Pictures from Yang's blog show that the 26-year-old star spent five days dining, sightseeing and debauching in London with **Huo Qiren** (霍啓人) and his wealthy young friends at the end of last month. Huo — who reportedly had a girlfriend — is the 21-year-old scion of a Hong Kong family worth a reported NT\$80 billion.

Male members of the Huo clan are known for their high-profile affairs with famous women. Big brother Kenneth Huo (霍啓剛) has been going steady with top Chinese athlete Guo Jingjing Huo Oishan (霍啓山) dated Zhang Ziyi (章子怡), before the superstar moved on to Israeli

theater. The 2008 incarnation of this event opens today with a production of Liou Ching-ti's Hell (劉青提的地獄) by the Taiwan Bangzi Company (台灣豫劇團), directed by Malaysian-born Fu Hungcheng (符宏征). This will establish the theme of the festival, which runs to Dec. 28 and includes two other productions that are also experiments based on traditional opera styles.

This theme of variations on tradition is highly appropriate for a year that has seen an almost unprecedented number of large-scale productions that sought to give new life to traditional theater with an infusion of contemporary or Western blood.

"In the last two or three years, we have hoped that groups can find a path that leads from the traditional arts to something new," said Liu Chiung-shu (劉 瓊淑), artistic director of the CKS Cultural Center (國立中正文化中心). Tonight's performance is based on Henan opera, also called bangzi (梆子). The second production in the series draws from the traditions of nanguan (南管) and beiguan (北管), and the final production takes qun(崑) opera as its point of departure.

The transfusion of new elements into a centuries-old tradition is a dangerous business, and over the last few years several very high-profile productions have barely survived the operation. With such bold experimentation it is often advisable to start small and, if nothing else, the shorter running times of these productions, which are to be staged in the National Theater's Experimental Theater, will certainly make them more easily digestible for audiences.

A string of directors, producers and actors interviewed in recent years have all commented on the richness of the Chinese operatic tradition and the many

things it has to offer modern theater. But how to repackage it for audiences who lack a detailed knowledge of Chinese history and legend, or the patience to sit through three-hour epics, has proved a challenge.

Tonight's premiere of Liou Chingti's Hell brings together Henan opera performers with the veteran experimental theater director Fu Hung-cheng. It is based on the popular Buddhist tale Mu Lien Saves His Mother (目蓮救母). According to Fu, the current production departs from tradition in focusing on the psychological factors that led Mu Lien's mother, the Liou Ching-ti of the title, to deserve the terrible fate of being dragged by demons to the very deepest levels of Hell. The story incorporates elements from other famous stories of women embittered by the oppressiveness of society, and through the device of the double stage incorporates modern scenes in which the "hell on Earth" that Liou created for herself before her descent into Hell can be juxtaposed against dilemmas in modern society.

"We have kept the beautiful singing of Henan opera and also many of the movements," Fu said, "but this is integrated with many techniques of contemporary experimental theater. We hope in this way to bring new audiences to traditional opera."

The second production in the series, The Drought Goddess (大神魃) by Ethan Chen Production House (野墨坊), runs from Dec. 19 through Dec. 21. Li Ling, the Abandoned Hero (半世英雄 — 李陵) by 1/2Q Theater, is the third production and plays from Dec. 25 through Dec. 28. Tickets for all performances are NT\$500 from NTCH ticketing.

High Tide rides the wave

No one was more taken aback at the outcome of this year's ICRT Battle of the Bands than the winners themselves: "We were really surprised because we had technical difficulties, our gear broke on stage ..." said Moshe Foster, lead singer for reggae band High Tide, which plays tomorrow night at VU Livehouse

"Shit had a whack attack!" added trombone player Andy Francis. "Despite that, we engaged the crowd, we had little kids up and dancing," said Bassist Mike Tennant.

Since the win they've been getting airtime at ICRT; this week they are being played three times a day.

"Look at ICRT's playlist," said Foster. "What are the chances of ever hearing music like that if we hadn't won? We thought we were the underdogs, it's not what the programmers are telling us people want to hear."

tomorrow for the early show at VU, playing between the sets and also doing live dub with the band, adding delays and effects to the percussion. Guest artist Richie Partridge, formerly of Massive Attack, will be jamming with them on percussion as well.

Also playing is Blood Orange, an instrumental band that is garnering a small but devoted following. "The basis of the music is punk," said trumpet player Charles McHale, with elements of experimental 1960s jazz and bossanova interludes. "There's a lot of hard, fast changes and jumps. Without a vocalist it allows the music to shift more quickly," said McHale

High Tide plays a more modern version of reggae: "Instead of playing traditional roots reggae beat, the onedrop, we might do a 4/4 beat, something you hear more in dance music," said Foster. "[We] can go from a dub beat to a dance beat and all the instruments sequentially converge on a melody and a counter-melody. We'll do that for 15 seconds and dump it all back into a slow dub beat."

Tennant credits Hide Tide's unique sound to their experience playing in other bands: "We all have other influences so we bring that in, we want to play it with our own personalities and will outlive these systems of control." styles. There's a conservative mindset
