

Thought you'd already put 2008 to bed? Wait a minute. Here's a list of top tunes from last year selected by some of the country's top vinyl junkies.

KINK FEATURING RACHEL ROW — WET

"This track is a definite floor-stomper. Bulgaria's tech house hero brings his signature acid/bouncy sound as a backdrop to Row's sexy and seductive vocals. The stutters midway make for an excellent buildup to an all-out acid bonanza. This tune destroyed the dance-floor many times while I was on tour this fall." (Sona)

THE SUNBURST BAND — JOURNEY TO THE SUN

"It's a 2008 release though it sounds like it came from some disco lab orbiting Earth since the early 1970s. Imagine a millennium party on the Starship Enterprise, all hands on deck and in the air, and you begin to get a feel for this timeless tune. To me, it's not only the perfect musical embodiment of the Citrus party vibe, but reaffirms that house music can be great live music as well." (SL)

PHOTONZ — SHABOO (ANDY'S EDIT)

"In the era of MP3 downloads, there is still room for underground music: Dissident Distribution release singlesided vinyl, each limited to 500 copies, and each of their 12 inches is just the bomb. This track sounds like a lost gem from [the] 1988-Chicago House era. Aciiiiid!!" (BB)

SIGUR ROS — MEO SUO I EYRUM VIO SPILUM ENDALAUST (ALBUM)

"I've been hunkered in the studio listening only to my own stuff for a long time. However, I cannot recommend discovering Sigur Ros highly enough. Their summer album was a perfect follow-up to the delicious *Takk* a few years back." (Viba)

MIA — PAPER PLANES

"A Clash sample, finger snaps, four gunshots and a cash register ka-ching gets song-of-the-year honors. MIA's brilliant Paper Planes pokes fun at immigrant life and confirms that **Diplo** is the sound of the 21st century. The song had legs all year because of the notable remixes (DFA) and TI's hood anthem Swagger Like Us sampled MIA on the chorus. (Marcus Aurelius)

AUDIO SLINGERS FEAT. LESLEY WILLIAM — RADIO NOISE (KELEVRA REMIX)

This is a big-bass electro track with a female vocal. I find that you can get away with playing some really dirty sounding bass-driven tracks that have a sexy female vocal. It seems to even each other out and you end up with a phat-sounding track. (Matty D)

LIL WAYNE — A MILLI


"It's like the minimalism of hip-hop. A Milli is a timeless track that's not only made The Carter III a platinum album, it also shows the world what an outstanding rapper Lil Wayne really is. JUNKIE TOWN — EL RITMO

A 'gezai' whodunit

↑ he Formosa-Zephyr Opera Troupe (臺灣春風 歌劇團) has done some strange things with the *gezai* opera (歌仔戲) format in the past, and it is up to its antics again with Murder in a Snowbound Inn (雪夜客棧殺人事件), a take on Agatha Christie's Murder on the Orient Express that opens today at Taipei's Experimental Theater.

The show is being presented just prior to the National Theater going into its pre-Lunar New Year hibernation and refurbishment, and follows hard on the heels of the New Idea Theater Festival (新點 子劇展), which focused this year on giving classical opera a modern twist. This is hardly an ideal time slot, but the group is uniquely well-placed within the gezai opera establishment because it is composed completely of students and alumni of National Taiwan University (國立台灣大學) and National Taiwan Normal University (國立台灣師範大學) and thus represents a new demographic of young, highly educated people who are interested in preserving traditional culture. With its ability to draw on student audiences, backed by a strong track record, it is not surprising that all four performances this weekend are already sold-out.

Director Su Chih-yun (蘇芷雲) has a degree in veterinary science, scriptwriter Hsu Mei-hui (許美 惠) has a degree in social work and lead performer Li Pei-ying (李佩穎) graduated with a law degree and a master's in sociology. All three have achieved a strong track record in theater, most notably with

their production of The Venetian Twins (威尼斯雙 胞案), a modern *gezai* opera based on a story by Venetian playwright Carlo Goldoni, at the Sixth

gezai troupe with the resources to mount an original production from scratch. "There are some groups of young people who are trying to make a go of being *gezai* performers. We are distinct from the older generation, but want to carry on this local tradition," troupe director Yeh Mei-ru (葉玫汝), who graduated with a law degree from National Taiwan University and has dedicated herself to work in gezai opera for past last five years, told the Taipei *Times* in an interview last June.

In the case of Murder in a Snowbound Inn. Formosa-Zephyr aimed to explore a new format using gezai opera. According to lead performer Li, the group wanted to get away from *gezai* stereotypes in which the lead male is always something of a romantic hero. In this case, she said, there are no moonlit assignations and eternal partings, just the calculated pushing forward of a plot to discover who committed the murder. The sense of suspense that Murder in a Snowbound Inn creates is very different from judicial-themed operas, where the audience almost invariably knows more than the performers. Keeping the audience in the dark is quite a new departure for gezai opera, she said.

Nestled in a corner on the seventh floor of Sogo Department Store's Fuxing branch, Danbo Fun (蛋蛋屋新洋食館) is a midpriced restaurant serving Japanese-style curries and Western entrees in an unusually decorated but comfortable space.

The decor in this long, narrow corridor-like space has an odd charm, with a combination of 1950s colors, 19th-century grandeur and a sci-fi vibe. On one side of the restaurant are several large booths that seat four people each, shaped in a semicircle and upholstered in orange vinyl; on the other is a long cream-yellow booth sofa. Four large chandeliers hang on curved beams, a crystal-bead curtain dangles above the kitchen area, and neon lights glow and shift color from behind a tall curtain. Mirrors on the two-story-high walls make the space appear larger than it really is.

Danbo Fun is the upscale sister of Tamago Ya (蛋蛋屋), a small chain of restaurants that claims to be Taiwan's first establishment devoted to omurice (蛋包飯), the popular Japanese invention of fried rice stuffed inside an egg omelet.

Omurice features on the menu and is offered in combinations such as classic curry and breaded pork cutlet with salad (NT\$280), or for a little of everything, the "fried skinned" potatoes, salad, spaghetti and hamburger (NT\$300).

But Danbo Fun aims to offer more than just comfort food. Its "chef's recommendations" include roasted chicken leg with herbs, roasted vegetables and rice (NT\$320) and pan-fried salmon with risotto (NT\$380). The curry chicken and turmeric rice (NT\$320) was well presented, with the curry served in a small brass pot, and a side of roasted cherry tomatoes, snow peas, cucumber and pumpkin. The chicken was pan-fried and cooked in a sauce surprisingly light for Japanese curry. The rice was fragrant and prepared pilaf-style, with cooked with onions, chopped mushroom and turmeric.

Danbo Fun's extensive menu also includes gratin dishes and pasta. One nice surprise was the penne with wild mushroom, bacon and tomato (NT\$260). The pasta had the right al dente texture and the sauce tasted freshly prepared.

Cheesecake (NT\$130) is a popular choice for desserts, staff said, but it was sold out on my last visit. The panna cotta (NT\$120) was rich and creamy, but doused in a caramel sauce that made it a little too sweet. — DAVID CHEN

Chicken soup is an oft-prescribed remedy for the common cold, but at Lung Hsian Chu (龍涎居), the curative properties of this most humble of dishes go far beyond that. The chain restaurant claims its selection of soups, all made with herbs and organic chicken, improve blood circulation, increase energy, strengthen the stomach, spleen and kidneys, reduce swelling if you are feeling bloated and meliorate the skin.

But don't mistake Lung Hsian Chu for a pharmacy. Its broths are made with many of the same herbs found in traditional Chinese medicine but are nonetheless very palatable.

The concept is simple. You choose the broth first and then the kind of poultry, which determines the price of the dish. Options include common pheasant (山雞, NT\$120 per bowl), whose Chinese name translates literally into "mountain chicken" but is called "imitation free-range chicken" on Lung Hsian Chu's English-language menu, free-range chicken (土雞, NT\$150), black-skinned chicken (烏骨雞, NT\$170) and vegetarian chicken (素雞, NT\$160). The menu also features chicken hearts and gizzards (下水, NT\$30), as well as rooster testicles (雞佛, NT\$100), which are supposed to ramp up virility in men.

We ordered wild grape chicken broth (山葡萄雞) with blackskinned chicken and fleece flower root and chicken broth (何首 鳥雞) with free-range chicken. According to the menu, the wild grape chicken broth is good for the liver and eyes, helps regulate menstruation and improves blood circulation. The broth was mild but complex in flavor, its savoriness cut with a hint of sweetness. The black-skinned chicken was delightful. Chopped into thin, boned slices, the meat absorbed the flavor of the soup but retained its own hearty gaminess.

The wild grape chicken soup did not taste at all like medicinal herbs, but the fleece flower root chicken broth was another matter. It is made from the root of Chinese knotweed and had the very pungent bittersweet flavor often associated with concoctions from zhongyao pharmacies. Neither of us found the flavor objectionable, however, and we were encouraged by the fact that the soup is supposed to strengthen your body and improve your skin. The free-range chicken was somewhat bland when contrasted with the rich flavor of the broth, which probably would have been better matched with the black-skinned chicken. — CATHERINE SHU
